CODE OF CONDUCT for PARENTS & VISITORS

- We expect all parents and visitors to be courteous to all members of staff and children in accordance with our general behavioural, equal opportunity and racial equality policies. Please also see the Home/School Agreement.

- All parents and visitors must sign in at the school office and receive and wear a visitor's badge if they are entering the school premises

- All parents and visitors must have a clear purpose for their visit to the school, which should be stated when they sign in at the office.

- Teachers are available at the start and the end of the day when they line their classes up in the playground to speak to parents and carers briefly.

- For any discussions of length/substance, parents must make an appointment with the member of staff concerned.

- Adults must never approach children directly regarding any issues/concerns. This should always be done via a member of staff or parent of the child.

- Failure to comply with the above may result in parents/visitors being banned from the school premises.

- School gates open at 8.40am

- Please leave promptly after collecting your child after school to prevent any safeguarding issues

Colvestone Primary School and Thomas Fairchild Community School federated on September 1st 2017 after three years of a successful partnership, and a consultation process with parents and staff earlier this year. The federation is called Soaring Skies, and is committed to providing the best education and opportunities for over 600 children across the two schools.

Although you can find an outline of our shared vision on each school's website, I thought it would be helpful to explain a little more about what the federation means for the two schools, for its pupils and their parents and carers. All of the below can also be found on the websites for both schools.

What is a federation?

A formal partnership between two schools, with an executive headteacher overseeing both staff and pupil bodies. I am executive headteacher of the Soaring Skies federation, and head of Colvestone Primary School. At Thomas Fairchild there is also a head of school, Ms. Heather Smith.

Does the federation benefit either school in terms of funding? School budgets are under greater strain than ever, and this is more acute in a one-form school like Colvestone. Hackney's changing demographic also means the number of children who are eligible for pupil premium funding is decreasing, and will negatively affect our budgets.

Partnership with another school allows us to combine or exchange resources: for instance, for part of this year Colvestone's dancing and drumming House Time lessons have moved to Thomas Fairchild, while Colvestone is providing Mandarin, yoga and Gardening instead. Both schools have resident gardeners and a shared resident artist. The delivery of sports clubs, art provision and other enrichment activities is more achievable when we are able to pool our resources.

We are also looking at other ways in which we can attract more funding: for instance, working closely with Colvestone's FSA which has charitable status and maximising the funding potential Thomas Fairchild has being so closely located to the city.

Does the federation benefit either school in terms of staffing?

Yes, and this is one of the key factors driving the federation. Smaller schools (Colvestone is single-form, while Thomas Fairchild is two-form) can leave teachers with limited opportunities to progress - to mentor or learn from others, to take on additional responsibilities, to share experiences. With two sets of staff now working much more closely, there are greater opportunities for individuals to grow, meaning higher staff retention and greater stability for your children - as well as improved teaching and a more varied curriculum.

As executive head teacher for the Soaring Skies federation, I appointed Thomas Fairchild's head of school, Ms Heather Smith, in January 2016; she is a highly experienced teacher, with whom I have a long and collaborative working relationship. With Ms Smith in place, I am able to give the Soaring Skies federation, and Colvestone, the focus they need.

Has the federation affected the makeup of the governing bodies?

Yes. There is now a single governing body across both schools. Where we had two parent governors from each school on their respective governing bodies, we will now have one elected parent governor from each school; elections for this role will be held before October half term. The governing board is composed of two elected parent governors, one staff governor and the rest are co-opted or local authority governors.

Will teachers or pupils be moving between schools? Will there be shared trips, school productions or other events?

The schools may share some staff, but lessons for pupils will take place on their own school sites. The federation does not affect the admissions process: parents will still apply on behalf of their children to the school of their choice. On occasion, pupils may visit other schools to share specialist resources or take part in joint events. .

What would happen if the schools wanted to defederate at a later date?

The governing board will review the arrangement in five years' time, to see if it has been successful. If at any time a school wishes to leave the federation, there is a standard process we would follow.

These are demanding times for schools and for teachers. It is my firm belief that together we are stronger - more resilient and flexible in a time of change, more outward-facing, and better placed to achieve the excellent results I want for all Soaring Skies pupils.
